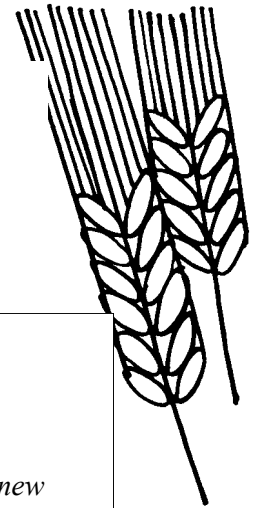

(O/Z) Lenten Soup and Study – *Liberating Hope*

During Lent this year, we will be studying the book *Liberating Hope: Daring to Renew the Mainline Church* by Michael S. Piazza and Cameron B. Trimble. This is a wonderful book aimed at helping to revive small, mainline, progressive congregations.

While the entire book is certainly worth reading, for the sake of time, we will be focusing on 6 of the 11 chapters: Expectant with Possibilities, Transformational Community, Transformational Leadership Skills, Transformational Mission, Transformational Worship, and Leading Congregations to Change. We will be discussing one chapter per week. While it would certainly be helpful to have each chapter read before we discuss it, please don't avoid coming simply because you haven't had the chance to finish (or maybe even start!) the chapter for the week. We value everyone's input and discussion and would love to have you.

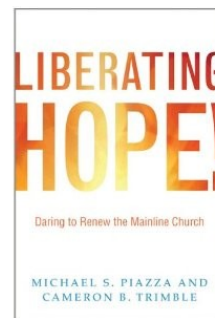

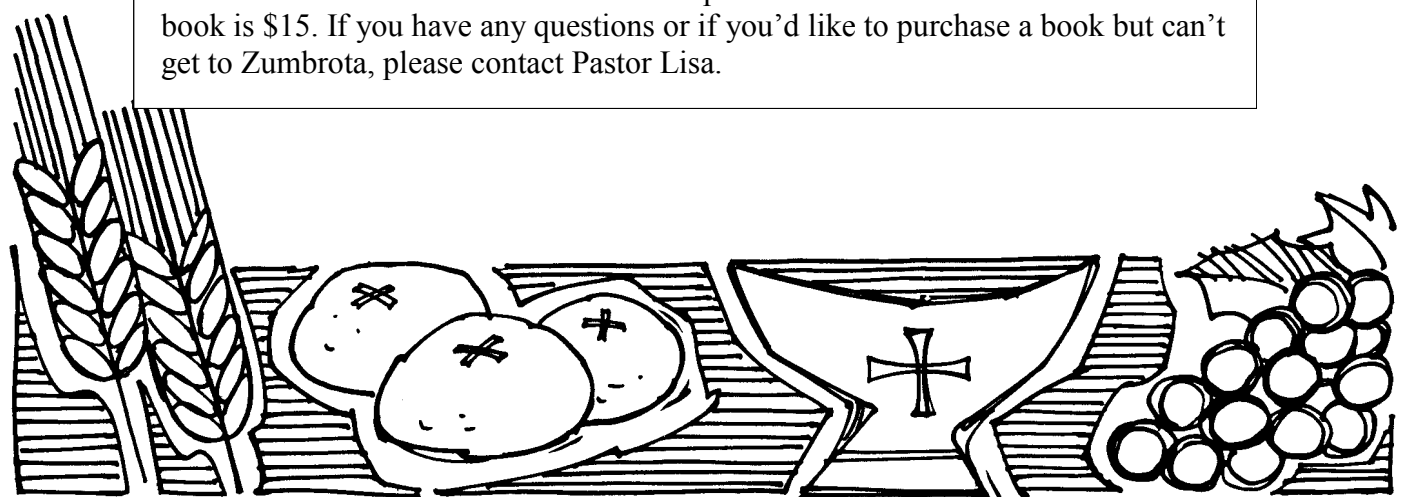

FROM THE PASTOR

Hope can be a funny thing.

Sometimes we relish hope. We live into that feeling of joyful expectation, that wisp of a dream for something different ... something better ... something fresh.

Sometimes we cling to hope. In the face of our worries, in the face of a frightening diagnosis, in the face of loss and floundering and insecurity, we grab onto hope with both hands because it can buoy us up out of the despair and anxiety that threaten to swallow us up.

Sometimes, though, we can also shy away from hope. We worry that if that hope lifts us too high, the situation we're facing could never deliver something to match the hope that has crept in around the jagged corners of our fears. We prescribe to the idea that if we don't hope for anything, we cannot and will not be disappointed. We think those who dare to hope are reckless at best, hanging their dreams and desires on tenuous branches.

I think that when it comes to our churches, we may find ourselves in that final category more often than we'd like to admit. Yes, our beloved congregations are generally small and generally aging. Yes, we are located in rural areas with somewhat limited resources and opportunities. Yes, we may be weary in body and spirit.

But we cannot let that weariness and apprehension rob our hope of the strength and potential that it brings!

In his letter to the Christians in Rome, Paul writes:

For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. (Rom 8:24-25)

Paul is encouraging us to wait not in tentative and fearful hope but in a hope born of confidence and

conviction. We are children of the God of hope – a God who understands fear and pain and anxiety, a God who understands what it means to be tempted and taunted and tried. But our God is also a God who has faced down death and overcome. In the resurrection of Christ, God gave us a solid basis for our hope: Salvation. Mercy. Grace upon grace.

Catholic priest and theologians Henri J. M. Nouwen once wrote, “Hope is trusting that something will be fulfilled, but fulfilled according to the promises and not just according to our wishes. Therefore, hope is always open-ended. I have found it very important in my own life to let go of my wishes and start hoping. It was only when I was willing to let go of wishes that something really new, something beyond my own expectations, could happen to me.” (*from Seeds of Hope*, p. 159-160)

As the church, I feel like we're just entering this season of hope together. There are wonderful new things going on in both OZ congregations. There is new leadership. There are new ideas.

There is hope!

In the spirit of this hope, during Lent, we will be working through some chapters in a wonderfully inspiring book called *Liberating Hope* by Michael S. Piazza and Cameron B. Trimble. (More information is located in the following newsletter.) We will be exploring what Nouwen has called open-ended hope – a hope in who we can be as the body of Christ in both Zumbrota and Oronoco, a confidence in God's calling for us as congregations, a conviction that we have a transformational voice to share and a transformational presence to be here in southeastern Minnesota.

Join us in this soup and study. Join us in discussion. But above all, join us in **hope**.

These times of silence will be dispersed throughout the worship service.

Readers of OZ *Zealot is the Next Book*

The book chosen for discussion is *Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth* by Reza Aslan. It was named one of the best books of last year by *Publishers' Weekly*, *Booklist* and many others. All are welcome to join in what promises to be a lively discussion.

The title gives a good indication of what the book is about, but when the author was asked what he hoped readers, especially religious readers, would take away from his book, Aslan said:

"My hope is that this book provides readers with a more complete sense of the world in which Jesus lived. We cannot truly understand Jesus' words and deeds if we separate them from the religious and po-

litical context of his time. Regardless of whether you think of Jesus as a prophet, a teacher, or God incarnate, it is important to remember that he did not live in a vacuum. Whatever else Jesus was, he was, without question, a man of his time. This is true for all of us. The key to understanding who Jesus was and what Jesus meant lies in understanding the times in which he lived. That's what this book does. It drops you in the middle of Jesus' world and helps you understand the context out of which he arose and in which preached." (amazon.com)

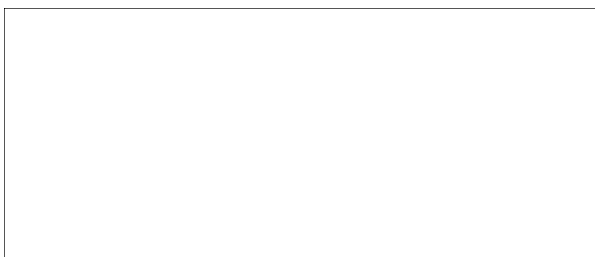
(O/Z) Updating the Directory
