# Holy Week and Easter Worship Schedule

Maundy Thursday service – Thursday, Mar. 28 @ 7:00 p.m., Z. church Good Friday/Tenebrae service – Friday, Mar. 29 @ 7:00 p.m., O church

In the Maundy Thursday service, we have the opportunity to come together as brothers and sisters in Christ to celebrate and remember the meal that Jesus shared with his most beloved friends. It is an intimate service in which we can share with each other the conviction and compassion that Jesus shared with his disciples that night thousands of years ago as we share the bread and wine in communion.

I know that we haven't done a Good Friday service in some time, but I'm going to encourage everyone to attend this service. It's a Tenebrae Service – a service of light and dark. In this service, we walk through Jesus' last days and hours, interspersing Scripture passages with hymns and choir pieces. As we go deeper and deeper into the story of Christ's arrest, torture, and crucifixion, the sanctuary will grow darker and darker. We will end in darkness, leaving us room to contemplate Christ's death and celebrate his imminent resurrection

Easter worship on Sunday, March 31, will be held at the regular times in both churches (9:00 at Z, 11:00 at O.)

# FROM THE PASTOR

Last month, we talked about using the season of Lent to draw closer to God. It is my hope and prayer that you're all making strides along this journey. But if you're not, remember that this path isn't going to be an easy or quick.

This Lenten excursion is a two-fold journey. First, it is a journey through our own souls. As we navigate the hidden corners and dark side streets, we can discover things about ourselves that we may not have known before. Sometimes, we uncover weaknesses or shortcomings we wish had stayed hidden. When this is the case, it's important to remember the words of Philippians: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (4:13) Believe it or not, that "all things" even includes conquering whatever demons lay in wait for us, in the world or in our souls.

But along this journey through the soul, we can also discover strength and resilience we didn't know we possessed. We can find bright spots – unexpected spaces of beauty and inspiration, faith and trust, compassion and potential for growth. These are places in our souls that have been touched by the Holy Spirit. They are the footprints of Jesus within us. They are gifts from God that help us get through the rough patches, that remind us we are never alone as we navigate this path through our faith and our lives.

Second, Lent is a journey with Jesus toward Jerusalem. Unlike the disciples that were with Jesus millennia ago, we are aware that as we walk this welltrod and dusty road, we are walking toward the darkness of Christ's betrayal, arrest, torture, crucifixion, and death. We know that Jesus is moving ever closer to his end, and we know how truly painful and agonizing that end will be. And when we come together to worship on Good Friday, we experience the significance and power of this part of the journey – the anguish, the fear, and the ultimate acceptance.

But there is beauty in this part of our Lenten journey as well. There is a powerful intimacy in the way we celebrate the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday. Jesus not only shared bread and wine but his very self with those he loved the most, and as we participate in this special observance of the Lord's Supper, we have the joy and the privilege of sharing that same trust, companionship, and love with our brothers and sisters in Christ. There is also a formidable love in Jesus' sacrifice on the cross – in his willingness, in his humility, his prayerfulness. This is truly a love above any other. It is a love that crosses any and all boundaries. It is a love that can move mountains and pull us up out of the deepest depths. It is a holy love.

Everyone's Lenten journey will look different. We each struggle with different things. We find hope and joy in different places, and we discover renewals through different practices. Whatever shape your Lenten journey is taking, I pray that Jesus remains at the center of it. I pray that you feel the Holy Spirit guiding you, lifting you up and infusing you with strength when you need it. And if there is anything that you feel you need to talk about or pray about, my door is always open.

## (O/Z) Prayer Chain
