WHAT IS PENTECOST?

Pentecost is the great festival that marks the birth of the Christian church by the power of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost means "fiftieth day" and is celebrated fifty days after Easter.



WHAT HAPPENED ON PENTECOST?

Ten days after Jesus ascended into heaven, the twelve apostles, Jesus' mother and family, and many other of His disciples gathered together in Jerusalem for the Jewish harvest festival that was celebrated on the fiftieth day after Passover. While they were indoors praying, a sound like that of a rushing wind filled the house and tongues of fire descended and rested over each of their heads. This was the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on human flesh promised by God through the prophet Joel (Joel 2:28-29). The disciples were suddenly empowered to proclaim the gospel of the risen Christ. They went out into the streets of Jerusalem and began preaching to the crowds gathered for the festival. Not only did the disciples preach with boldness and vigor, but by a miracle of the Holy Spirit they spoke in the native languages of the people present, many who had come from all corners of the Roman Empire. This created a sensation. The apostle Peter seized the moment and addressed the crowd, preaching to them about Jesus' death and resurrection for the forgiveness of sins. The result was that about three thousand converts were baptized that day. (You can read the Biblical account of Pentecost in Acts 2:1-41).

WHY DO WE CELEBRATE PENTECOST?

There are three "mega-festivals" commemorated in the Christian calendar. The first two, Christmas and Easter, are well known to both believers and non-believers. But it's possible that even liturgical Christians may not be as familiar with the third, the festival of Pentecost. God the Father's wonderful Christmas gift of His one and only Son, and Christ's Easter triumph over the power of sin, death, and the devil would be of no benefit to us if the Holy Spirit did not give us the gift of saving faith. Through the Word and Sacraments, the Holy Spirit gives us the faith which believes and trusts in Christ as our Savior. This precious gift of faith in the saving work of our Lord Jesus Christ is the reason Pentecost is the third "mega-festival" of the church and why we celebrate it with such joy and thanksgiving.



From the Pastor

A Methodist pastor, a Catholic priest, and a Presbyterian pastor were having a conversation about the mouse problem that their churches were having. The Methodist pastor said, "I just can't figure out how to get rid of those little pests!" The Catholic priest agreed, saying, "We tried getting traps. We tried getting cats. We can't get rid of the mice either!" The Presbyterian pastor laughed and said, "We got rid of our mice a long time ago!" "How did you get rid of them?" the other two asked. "Simple," the Presbyterian replied. "We confirmed all of our mice, and they never came back!"

This is a joke that I heard from one of my seminary professors. It's a terrible joke, but it contains a disturbing kernel of truth. Even if you substituted any of the other denominations, this would remain true. It seems that once our youth have been confirmed within the church, they walk out the doors and rarely (if ever!) return. Not too long ago, I was at a meeting with other UCC pastors in the cities discussing just this very phenomenon. Not surprisingly, our 2-hr. meeting/brainstorming session left us with more questions than answers, but we did come to one conclusion: confirmation, at least "the way we've always done it," is broken. So this month, I wanted us to think about confirmation, and, more generally, about the education and participation of our youth in the lives of our congregations.

Paul reminds us that "the gifts God gave were ... for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children ... but speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body ... promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love." (from Eph. 4:4-16) Paul is basically describing the way in which those who were part of the early church taught and mentored and nurtured new-comers in the faith.

It was certainly different for these first Christians than it is for us today. Many of them were new to the faith as adults while many of our young people today have grown up in the church. They've grown up listening to Sunday school lessons about Old Testament stories and New Testament parables. They've grown up singing songs of faith like "This Little Light of Mine" and "Jesus Loves Me." They've grown up doing what they can to participate in congregational activities.

Through all of these activities, they've been learning life-lessons about faith – what it means to let faith live in our hearts, what it means to live out faith in the community, and the ways that faith can manifest itself in different spiritual gifts. These are ways in which we as congregations have the opportunity (and the responsibility) to put into practice something we may have forgotten somewhere along the way: We've promised to help these young people grow in their faith.

As Christians, we talk about faith as a relational, experiential, living faith, and we spend hours discussing how much this faith means to us both on a day-to-day basis and in the midst of crises. But confirmation is only the beginning. If we expect to be able to keep our young people active in our congregations instead of bolting for the door, we have to be willing to hear the answers to those questions and help students find their place within the life of the church based on those answers. We need to be willing to let them take on roles of leadership and responsibility. I may be on maternity leave right now – getting to know the hearts and routines of my own children – but when I return this summer, I want to make this one of my priorities: getting to know the hearts and routines of the vouth in these congregations so we, as communities of faith, can help them find genuine, meaningful ways that they can participate in the lives of these congregations. This how we "promote the body's growth in building itself up in love," and it involves love, openness, and above all, trust.





The Book Thief by Markus Zuzak is the last selection for the Readers of OZ before their summer break. The group will meet at the home of Parker and Linda Quammen on Tuesday, May 14, at 7 p.m. Everyone is welcome to join in the discussion of this unusual book, which holds appeal both for young adults and older readers as well.

According to the Library Journal review, "Death himself narrates the World War II-era story of Liesel Meminger from the time she is taken, at age nine, to live in Molching, Germany, with a foster family in a working-class neighborhood of tough kids, acidtongued mothers, and loving fathers who earn their living by the work of their hands. The child arrives having just stolen her first book-although she has not yet learned how to read-and her foster father uses it, The Gravediggers Handbook, to lull her to sleep when shes roused by regular nightmares about her younger brother's death. Across the ensuing years of the late 1930s and into the 1940s, Liesel collects more stolen books as well as a peculiar set of friends: the boy Rudy, the Jewish refugee Max, the mayors reclusive wife (who has a whole library from which she allows Liesel to steal), and especially her foster parents. Zusak not only creates a mesmerizing and original story but also writes with poetic syntax, causing readers to deliberate over phrases and lines, even as the action impels them forward. Death is not a sentimental storyteller, but he does attend to an array of satisfying details, giving Liesel's story all the nuances of chance, folly, and fulfilled expectation that it deserves. 


