

This year's Advent sermon series will fea ture one of my very favorite Christmas sto ries - *The Christmas Miracle of Jonathan Toomey* by Susan Wojciechowski. Each week, we will be reading a portion of the story in the sermon. If I could sit with each and every one of you in a circle and hold up the book so you could experience the beautiful illustration of P.J. Lynch, I would. But there will be a copy of the picture book at each church throughout the season so you peruse the pictures yourself as well as

catch up on any part(s) of the story that you might miss. Some of you may be familiar with this wonderful Christmas story (ssssshhh ... don't give away the ending!). For those who aren't, here's a brief description:

Jonathan Toomey is the best woodcarver in the valley. He keeps to himself, though, and never smiles or laughs. No one knows that a lace handkerchief, a tiny white blanket, and a portrait of the wife and child he's lost lie hidden in a drawer he never opens. One day in early winter the widow McDowell comes to call on the woodcarver. A quiet request leads to a joyful miracle as the widow and her son gently warm the sad heart of Jonathan Toomey.







A Word from Our Pastor

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. For those who lived in a land of deep shadows – light! Sunbursts of light! You repopulated the nation, you expanded its joy. Oh, they're so glad in your presence! Festival joy! The joy of a great celebration, sharing rich gifts and warm greetings. ... For a child has been born – for us! The gift of a son – for us! ~ Isaiah 9:2-3

Of all the passages of Scripture that we read during the Advent and Christmas seasons, this has always been my favorite. Maybe it's because I've lived my whole life in the Midwest – a place of beauty, to be sure, but a place that, during the winter months, can feel cold and dark. Surely "a land of deep shadows."

And in our lives, how often have we found ourselves walking in darkness? There are any number of things that at times can and do blot out the light, plunging our hearts and our spirits into darkness – illness, fear, uncertainty, stress, grief. We continue to move through life during these times, but we still feel that darkness. It eclipses everything else and dulls our reaction. Isaiah's words may have originally been spoken for the people of Israel, but they continue to resonate with us today. Surely, we know what it's like to be people who walk in darkness.

For the church, Advent is a season of waiting ... a season of expectation ... a season of darkness as we anticipate the coming of the Light. Today, it's easy for us to forget that part of Advent. Our to-do lists are so long. We have cookies to bake, presents to buy and wrap, trees and homes to decorate, carols to sing, loved ones to visit, favorite holiday movies to watch, Christmas cards/letters to write and send. We are surrounded by the glitz and sparkle of advertisements and lights. But sometimes this light only serves to make the darkness feel even thicker, even heavier, even darker.

And yet, in the face of this darkness, Isaiah speaks of

another Light – "sunbursts of light," even! The Hebrew word that Isaiah uses is the same word that gets used to describe daybreak, a Light so vivid and bright that it seems almost alive. In the face of our deepest darkness, this Light shines. And as John's gospel tells us, this is a Light that cannot be extinguished.

What came into existence was Life, and the Life was Light to live by. The Life-Light blazed out of the darkness; the darkness couldn't put it out. ~ John 1:4-5.

And where do we find this Light? In his own beautiful way, Isaiah tells us. "For a child has been born – for us! The gift of a son – for us!"

There is light in the eyes of a baby. There is light in a baby's smile, in a baby's laugh, in the peaceful look on a sleeping baby's face. But the Light that this child is about to bring goes beyond that light. The Light that is coming is one of salvation and grace and peace beyond measure. The Light that is coming will banish every darkness forever and wrap us in a love that we cannot even begin to imagine. This is the Light for which we wait during the Advent season. This is the Light which dawns anew for us each Christmas morning.

And so in the midst of this dark and cold season, in the midst of the twinkling lights and the red and green sprinkles, we pray ...

Come, Lord Jesus, come.

On a Cold Day, Some Years Ago

(O) People of the Church Update

At a recent informal meeting of the congregation, recommendations were made for distribution of funds raised through POC and including funds from the church treasury which were designated for outreach.

The following were approved and have been submitted: Students in Transition (a Rochester public school program to provide basic assistance for homeless students): \$300

<u>Dorothy Day House</u> (provides temporary housing and meals for the homeless):

\$200

Shelvis and Nancy Smith-Mather the missionary family sponsored by our congregation: \$200

<u>Join the Journey</u> (provides emotional support and other services to breast cancer patients): \$100

St. Peter Regional Treatment Center (many of the mentally ill patients at St. Peter do not have family or friends to give them support. This gift will provide needed clothing, personal supplies and Christmas gifts for residents): \$200

Mission 21 (provides services to children being bought

and sold in the commercial sex trade in Rochester and statewide in an effort to restore the lives of child victims): \$200

<u>Rochester Women's Shelter</u> (provides emergency shelter and counseling to victims of domestic abuse): \$200

Previously this year, POC contributed to Pine Island Area Home Services (\$150), Rochester Women's Shelter (\$150), Students in Transition (\$150), Presbyterian Women's Missions (\$200) and \$100 was used by Pastor Lisa for a local outreach need.

Our grand total in giving so far this year is \$2,250. Thanks to all who supported our luncheons and bake sales and who contributed cash donations to make this outreach program possible.

The book discussion group has selected "The Greatest Prayer" by John Crossen for our December discussion. We will meet on Tues 12/9 at 7:00 P.M. at the home of Rex and Lynn Wiederanders (40054 Highway 58 Boulevard, Goodhue). If you need directions give Rex or Lynn a call.

Publishers Weekly had this to say about our selection: "No prayer is better known in the Christian world than the Lord's Prayer, taught by Jesus to His disciples as they listened to Him preach about the Kingdom of God. Crossan, co-founder of The Jesus Seminar and acclaimed author of many works on the life and mission of Jesus Christ, writes to answer the question, "How can we who live today hear the words of the Lord's Prayer in ways that reflect the concerns of His immediate hearers and impact our lives 2,000 years later?" Delving deeply into the story of the Jewish nation in Jesus' time, Crossan shows how Jesus, couched in the words of this prayer, advises His followers to reject violent methods of resisting their Roman captors, and instead work for the coming of the Kingdom of God, the only way to achieve true freedom. The theme of nonviolence permeates this book and becomes the foundation for Crossan's understanding, not only of the Lord's Prayer, but also of a variety of extrabiblical sources he references to support his thesis. A fine effort by a fine scholar."
