From the Pastor

I came across a short video on the internet this afternoon. The video begins with a simple hook: “There is something strange about the geography of Israel. There are two seas in Israel ... the Dead Sea and the Sea of Galilee.” The video itself is comprised of a slideshow of photos of both seas.

and the Sea of Galilee.



The video goes on to compare the abundance and stunning variety of life found in and around the Sea of Galilee with the desolation and toxicity of the Dead Sea. It then points out that as different as they are, these two seas are fed by the same river: The Jordan River.

So what is the difference between the Sea of Galilee and the Dead Sea? What makes one so vibrant and full of life while the other is so barren and lifeless?

It’s simple.

The Sea of Galilee receives water at one end and gives out water at the other. The water within the sea itself is always moving and changing. But the Dead Sea, while it receives water at one end, has no outlet. It keeps all the water – all the salt and the sediment and everything else that the water carries – within itself. It has no way to be refreshed, no way to be cleansed.

The video ends with this quote: *So it is with life: If you receive but do not give, you do not live. So give, live and love.*

Friends, our life in the church is no different. This is the ultimate goal of mission ... of worship ... of spiritual formation ... of everything that we do and say and try to be together as the body of Christ: to take in the blessings of God, not so we can tightfistedly keep them to ourselves, but so we can hold them for a little while, let them move and transform and renew us, and then share them with others who are in need of renewal.

Paul shared a similar encouragement:

Everyone should give whatever they have decided in their heart. They shouldn’t give with hesitation or because of pressure. God loves a cheerful giver. God has the power to provide you with more than enough of every kind of grace. That way, you will have everything you need always and in everything to provide more than enough for every kind of good work. ~ 2 Corinthians 9:7-8

This is not a prosperity gospel, “give and God will be sure to double your investment for your own sake” sort of story. It’s a story about the importance of giving because when we give, it makes the world around us a better place. If you have been shown love today, share that love with someone else. If someone has given you a little grace today, share that grace with someone else. If someone has forgiven you today, take a step toward forgiving someone else.

So how will you transform the world with what you can give?

Our selection for September is “*Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End*” by Atul Gawande. Gawande, a practicing surgeon, addresses his profession's ultimate limitation, arguing that quality of life is the desired goal for patients and families. Gawande, a practicing surgeon, offers examples of freer, more socially fulfilling models for assisting the infirm and dependent elderly, and he explores the varieties of hospice care to demonstrate that a person's last weeks or months may be rich and dignified. Full of eye-opening research and riveting storytelling, *Being Mortal* asserts that medicine can comfort and enhance our experience even to the end, providing not only a good life but also a good end.

If you want to read ahead, the selection for October is “*The Road to Character*” by David Brooks. This selection is described as his most eye-opening and deeply personal book yet. David Brooks—*New York Times* bestselling author of *The Social Animal*—tells the story of ten great lives that illustrate how character is developed, and how we can all strive to build rich inner lives, marked by humility and moral depth. In a society that emphasizes success and external achievement, *The Road to Character* is a book about inner worth. It sounds like a worthy read!

So, enjoy your summer by adding a few good reads and plan to join us in September for stimulating discussion.

Habitat 500 Bike Ride 2016



Parker Quammen is preparing again to participate in the annual Habitat 500 Bike Ride, a 500-mile bicycle ride benefiting Habitat for Humanity which creates homeownership opportunities for low-income families by supporting the construction of simple, decent, affordable homes in partnership with families in need of adequate housing. During this year's Habitat 500, participants will celebrate the 2,400th Habitat home built in Minnesota. Over the past 23 years, the ride has raised over \$5 million for Habitat home construction in Minnesota, the United States, and around the world. This year's goal is to raise \$400,000! Thanks to generous sponsors, volunteers, and in-kind donors, \$0.97 of each \$1.00 raised through the Habitat 500 supports the mission of Habitat for Humanity. The 24th anniversary Ride, celebrating the construction of a total of 2,400 Habitat homes in MN, runs July 10 – 16 and takes a route that includes the following towns: Proctor, McGregor, Grand Rapids, Hibbing, Aurora, and Proctor.




