

### Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign

For more than 30 years, the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches has partnered with local food shelves to bring food to those in need in communities throughout the state. The Minnesota FoodShare March Campaign brings together hundreds of companies, civic groups, schools and congregations to help keep 300+ food shelves statewide stocked throughout the year. This grassroots campaign is our most enduring program. Schools, business, restaurants, congregations and stores are invited to participate in specified action weeks in March, so we will be joining in “A Different Kind of Food Fight” (this year’s campaign) by signing up your group or organization and join the fight against hunger here!

Throughout March, we will be collecting food donations and funds for the Oronoco Food Shelf. At the end of the month, we will total up our donations in dollars and pounds and report it to the Minnesota FoodShare organization, joining our efforts with those of other businesses, schools, and organizations around the state. You can designate any special offering during the month of March for this purpose by writing “March Campaign” in the memo line of your check or by using one of the small manilla offering envelopes and writing “March Campaign” on the outside of the envelope.

Also as part of this campaign, on **Sun., Mar. 25**, we will be participating in **Pack the Pews** event. The goal is to literally pack the church pews with as many donations – food and financial – as possible. Everything raised stays right here in Oronoco!



On Ash Wednesday, we began our worship service with a portion of a poem for reflection and meditation. It was a poem called "Stones" by Ann Weems:

*Was there ever anything as ordinary as a stone?  
The land is full of stones;  
plentiful, ordinary stones.  
Stones on the bank of the Jordan  
spilled over into the water –  
plentiful, ordinary stones –  
but there is an altar of  
twelve holy stones  
on the bottom of the Jordan,  
and there are twelve  
holy stones  
in the memory of God's people.*

*Ordinary stones don't speak  
and they don't sing,  
but holy stones do.*

Stones on the banks of the Jordan River? What stones is she talking about? What's the importance of those stones?

Flash back to the people of Israel waiting to cross the Jordan River. They have survived the exodus from Egypt and crossing the Red Sea. They have spent the last 40 years wandering in the desert with Moses. They've finally returned to the banks of the Jordan, and while they're preparing to cross to the other side, Moses dies, and Joshua becomes their new leader. Under Joshua's leadership, the people of Israel finally cross the Jordan River into the land that God promised them. Similar to the crossing of the Red Sea, they split the water so that the people can walk across the river on dry land, but unlike the crossing of the Red Sea, this time, what splits the water for them is carrying the covenant chest – the Ark of the Covenant, as Indian Jones would call it! – into the river.

Once they're finally on the other side of the river, Joshua selects one man from each of the 12 tribes and tells him to select a stone.

*"Joshua said to them, 'Cross over into the middle of the Jordan, up to the Lord your God's chest. Each of you, lift up a stone on his shoulder to match the number of the tribes of the Israelites. This will be a symbol among you. In the future your children may ask, "What do these stones mean to you?" Then you will tell them that the water of the Jordan was cut off before the Lord's covenant chest. When it crossed over the Jordan, the water of the Jordan was cut off.*

*These stones will be an enduring memorial for the Israelites."  
~ Joshua 4:5-7*



These 12 holy stones are a reminder – a reminder of God's presence and protection in the midst of wilderness wanderings, a reminder of God's fulfilled promise of bringing the people into the Promised Land, a reminder of God's undeniable power. They are such a simple, ordinary thing that God turns into something meaningful ... something poignant ... something holy.

This year, during Lent, we are taking simple, ordinary river stones and using them for a holy purpose as well. The names of all of our PCO members, friends, and visitors are written on river stones. (And we have extras for new visitors on any given Sunday!) On Ash Wednesday, we spent time with our own stones. We prayed for all of those things that burden our hearts and minds like heavy stones, then we brought them up to the cross at the front of the sanctuary, placing ourselves and our burdens at Jesus' feet.

Every Sunday morning throughout the rest of Lent, we will be spending time at the beginning of worship praying for one another with these stones. Everyone will receive a stone as the service begins – a stone with a name *not* their own. Then we'll spend some time lifting one another up in prayer before returning the stones to the foot of the cross. The stones will be a reminder that God is with us in the presence and prayers of one another, a reminder of God's promise to walk with us through our most difficult times just as we walk with and care for each other, a reminder of God's undeniable power and the undeniable power of Christian community.

Just like those 12 stones piled in the middle of the Jordan River, God can transform simple, ordinary things – like us! – and make us holy.

## Lenten sermon series – “Creeds and Confessions”

Throughout Lent this year, we will be digging a little bit deeper into our Presbyterianism. I know not all of us are “cradle Presbyterians” – those born and raised in the Presbyterian Church (USA). In fact, most of our congregation has come to Presbyterianism by another road ... or many other roads. This is one of the main reasons I’d like to dive into some of our foundational creeds and confessions as part of our Lenten sermon series.

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has two parts to its organizing constitution. Part I is *The Book of Confessions*, and Part II is *The Book of Order*. *The Book of Order* lays out all of the technicalities for how and why we function as a church – governing bodies, worship, administration of the sacraments, etc. *The Book of Confessions* is made up of the confessional documents that we hold as informative and inspirational to our faith. From *The Book of Confessions*: “The creeds, confessions, and catechisms of *The Book of Confessions* are both historical and contemporary. Each emerged in a particular time and place in response to a particular situation. Thus, each con-

fessional document should be respected in its historical particularity; none should be altered to conform to current theological, ethical, or linguistic norms. The confessions are not confined to the past, however; they do not simply express what the church was, what it used to believe, and what it one resolved to do. The confessions address the church’s current faith and life, declaring contemporary conviction and action.”

These confessions are not held in the same regard as Scripture, by any means. However, as Protestants and, more specifically, as Presbyterians, we believe in the theology of “a priesthood of all believers” – the idea that each of us is blessed with the knowledge of God and the inspiration from God, that we can all share the Good News of Jesus Christ . These confessions are a part of that. They are the words and witness – the confessions – of those who have gone before us.

There are 10 confessions. Throughout Lent, we will be exploring 5 of them. We’ll begin with the earliest – the Nicene Creed – then jump to the confessions that come out of the 20<sup>th</sup> century: the Theological Declaration of Barmen, the Confession of 1967, A Brief Statement of Faith, and the Confession of Belhar. We’ll consider how these words from Christians past continue to inform and inspire our faith today.

## About Per Capita

At the start of the new year, I wanted to once again remind you about per capita payments. Here’s a brief rundown of what per capita is and how it works.

“One of the great strengths of our denomination is its connectionism. Presbyterians in Minnesota and Wisconsin are tied to the larger church in ministry. One concrete form of that connection is through our per capita. Every Presbyterian church in the country is required to pay a certain amount for each active member on its rolls. This money goes to support the work and ministry of our church throughout the country.” – *from the website of the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area*

This year’s per capita payment is \$34.50 per member. Of that \$34.50, the largest portion (66%) is used by our presbytery while the rest is shared equally (17% each) between our synod (the Synod of Lakes and Prairies) and the General Assembly (national office).

It is and has been the policy of the Presbyterian Church of Oronoco to pay our per capita by the end of every year, whether individual members have contributed their apportionment or not. If you haven’t paid your per capita for this year, please consider doing so. You can make a check out to the O church and simply write “per capita” in the memo. If you’re not sure whether you’ve paid your per capita this year, please contact Kim Stanton.

## Chili Cook-Off and Lunch



On **March 18**, the Publicity Team is sponsoring a chili cook-off and lunch. This will be an event open to the community as well as the congregation.

As the name suggests, there will be two parts to this event: the chili cook-off competition and the lunch that follows. All entries must be at the church by the time judging begins at **12:00 p.m.** that Sunday. Everyone will have 15 mins. to taste test the various chilis and vote for their favorite. Everyone will be welcome to enjoy the chili for lunch beginning at **12:15 p.m.** along with various fixings and bars for dessert. Once lunch begins, we will tally the votes and award cash prizes for 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> place: **\$50** for 1<sup>st</sup>, **\$25** for 2<sup>nd</sup>, and **\$10** for 3<sup>rd</sup>. There will also be a special prize of a **\$25 Target gift card** for “Most Unique Chili.”

There will be no entry fee for anyone wishing to have their chili judged, and we will ask a free will donation at the door for the lunch.

There will be a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board to help provide the fixings, desserts, and beverages. There will also be spaces for a variety of chilis just so that we ensure we have enough chili options for lunch. But rest assured that congregations are eligible to win the prizes, too! There will also be fliers to hang up around Oronoco and the surrounding area available soon. ## Maundy Thursday Service Around the Table


